Tuskegee and Obamacare:

Fulfilling America's Promise of Health Care Justice

This presentation argues that the Affordable Care Act is properly seen as the fulfilment of the American promise to prevent instances like the Study of Untreated Syphilis in the African American Male conducted by the United States Public Health Service in Macon County, Alabama from 1932-1972. It begins with a background narrative that broadly conveys the elements and occurrences of the Study. This synopsis is followed by a discussion of the connection between the Tuskegee Study and the Syphilis Experiment in Guatemala operated simultaneously by the United States Public Health Service. The final section reviews the apology offered by President Clinton in 1997 for the Tuskegee Study and argues that the Affordable Care Act better embodies the distributive justice motif conveyed in the National Promise to atone for past Health Care injustice and to protect vulnerable populations from future abuses.



Dr. Darryl Scriven is Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences and Fellow in the Shipley Center for Innovation at Clarkson University. Prior to joining Clarkson, he was Dean of the College of Arts, Sciences, Business and Education as well as the John and Anna Hanes Distinguished Professor in Humanities at Winston-Salem State University. Scriven has also

served as the Chair of Visual Arts, Humanities and Theatre at Florida A&M University and the Inaugural Associate Director of Education at the Tuskegee University National Center for

Bioethics in Research and Health Care. He is currently the Academic Chair for the Journal of Humanities, Science, and Healthcare. Scriven is a documentarian, novelist, entrepreneur, and speaks frequently at universities and national seminars. He earned his M.A. & Ph.D. in Philosophy from Purdue University and B.S. degrees in Mathematics and Philosophy/Religion from Florida A&M University.
