International Visitors: The Process

The International Center is here to assist departments and faculty sponsors with hiring or hosting international faculty, staff and scholars under the J Exchange Visitor Program. This includes assistance with immigration document preparation, arrival guide for J Scholars and general scholar advising on J visa status.

Clarkson can issue documents under the following categories:

- J Professor / Research Scholar: Individual whose primary duties are teaching or research. These categories co-mingle. Length of stay is 3-weeks to 5-years
- J1 Short-Term Scholar: A professor, research scholar or person with similar education or accomplishments coming to the US on a short-term visit for the purpose of lecturing, observing, training or demonstrating special skills. Length of stay is up to 6-months.
- J Student Intern: Student pursuing a degree outside the US where the internship is fulfilling the education objective for his/her degree at home institution. Special conditions do apply. Length of stay is 3-weeks to 1-year.

Please visit the International Center intranet to view the 'Steps to host a J-1 Scholar'.

Important Note: Please allow at least 2 - 3 months processing prior to the start of the J program. This allows enough time for International Center staff to review and process the visa paperwork, visa processing - and - travel to Clarkson University.

STUDENT VISA APPLICATION CHALLENGES - IRAN

Our office has recently received many queries regarding the challenges that Iranian students face when they go through the student visa application process. Therefore, we thought it would be prudent to include this relevant information in our Faculty/Staff Newsletter.

We have gathered what we think are the four most important challenges students from Iran face -

Challenge #1 - There is not a US Consulate/Embassy in Iran. Students from Iran typically travel to Armenia, Dubai, or Turkey to apply for their student visas. This inconvenience was especially hard during Covid due to travel restrictions imposed by these countries. However, we have noticed that things are slowly getting back to normal.

Challenge #2 - Many US Consulates/Embassies are, post Covid, resuming their visa services but some serious backlogs remain. Priority is given to the citizens of the country in which the consulate is operating. Consequently, fewer visa interview slots are available to third country applicants.

Challenge #3 - Since US Consulates are experiencing backlogs, a reduced number of expedited/emergency appointments are available to students. However, not everyone is eligible for this path. For example, if a student had a recent visa denial, they are not eligible for an expedited appointment. In this instance, a student will have to wait 6 months before they can request an expedited visa appointment.

When a student does not follow the instructions on how to request an expedited visa appointment, their request will be denied and they will have to wait 6 months before they are eligible to request an expedited visa appointment again. Our International Center encourages students to visit the website of the US Consulate where they are having their visa interview and carefully review the instructions on how to request an expedited visa appointment to avoid a denial.

Challenge #4 - Administrative Processing (AP) is an extra layer of processing that is conducted by the Department of State. Unfortunately, there is nothing Clarkson University can do to expedite the process once a student is placed in AP. In addition, the time an application spends in AP is somewhat unpredictable. Our office has been monitoring the time some of our students have spent in AP. We notice that this can range from 45 days to 11 months.

Recently, another question has begun to emerge - is it necessary for the student to bring their individual study plan to the visa interview?

Please note that not all applicants will be asked to provide a study plan on their visa interview. If the US Consular Officer deems it necessary, he/she will request this information via a questionnaire which the student may complete at a later date. It is up to the student to clearly explain their reason to study in the U.S., including their areas of interest, and the reason why they chose Clarkson University.
